Lions began slowly and nervously in the opening minutes and as they struggled

The second session was in a similar vein. Lions continued to make mistakes but still managed to outshoot the Warriors 19-5. They went ahead again with Beeson's second of the evening counting, but again Warriors were on terms three minutes from the break when they netted amid a power play.

But within 25 seconds it was 4-3, Romanas Fedotovas making his first mark on the game with the strike.

Warriors player-coach Andy Hannah

was ejected at this point for verball abusing the referee with vehement complaints about the Lions' third goal.

Lions have been working hard on the power plays in practice and their patient was rewarded when Michael Ranby slo ting a pass to Michael Jacobs, who fire past a stranded Chelmsford net-minder.

But with 13 minutes left in the game Chelmsford again got on the scoreboar and Lions were under severe pressure.

With just five minutes left, Joe Berr finally ended the Warriors' resistance fin ishing off a move involving Jacobs an Rob Courtman, to pick up a rebound an find the net.

The game ended with Fedotovas an Chelmsford's Brown exchanging a bar rage of blows to earn both match penalties that will result in automatic one match bans for the pair.
