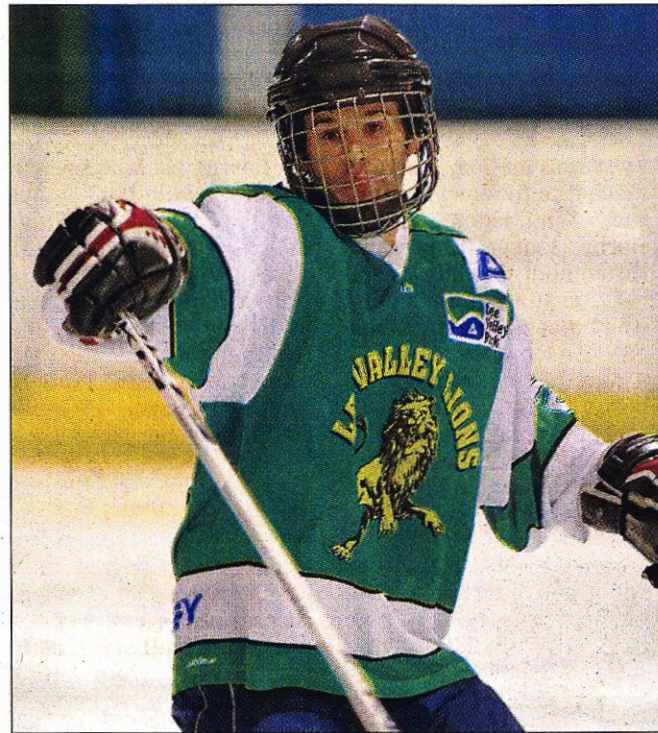
Dean Francis brought the Stars back to within one goal a minute later and it was all to play for in the final period.
